From Pastor Paul:

Dear Friends,

In my daily devotions this morning I read Psalm 30. In verse 5, I read: "Weeping may linger for the night, but joy comes with the morning." I was reminded of the love of God that is willing to be there for me, and for you, for us all.

I know that some of you have experienced those no-sleep, no-rest, no-peace nights. There are a lot of things that can take us to the brink of madness-in-the-night but there is One who can, and will, bring us back to a promised land of life. In verse 11: "... you have turned my mourning into dancing; you have taken off my crying-suit and clothed me with joy"

Why is God willing to forgive me? Why is God willing to love me? Why does God want to restore me? Those questions haunt the hearts of people of

faith who know the promises and blessings of God, while knowing the inner darkness of their own hearts. They know that they are not worthy of God's life washing forgiveness, yet, hope against hope, they believe that God will renew their lives.

Well now, you might be wondering "why is Pastor Paul going on about this stuff?" Good question. Day in and day out I meet people who are struggling with real life issues of meaning, suffering and shame. Those people seek a way to unburden their hearts. On the other hand, there are those people who feel no shame or burden that might be described as guilt. There are those who have no sense of responsibility about the evil of this world, thinking anything wrong is somebody else's fault. Yet many of them feel a shadow of darkness or a sense of emptiness. Truly I think that the Church serves best when it

offers comfort to those who are uncomfortable and bring discomfort to those who are too comfortable. We trust that by God's grace there is the hope of renewal and forgiveness and restoration of peace in the hearts and lives of all God's people. At least that is what I was thinking this morning during my devotions. What are you thinking?

I hope that you have discovered the life enhancing joy of taking a few minutes a day to read some scripture and say a prayer. It is amazing how you will feel more centered and more gleeful. (Living God does provide the 'Christ in our Home' booklets -on the entranceway rack - for those who need a starting point. May God bless your daily worship.
